

The station agent of the New Hampshire, Hartford and Northampton Railroad, and wife were drowned. The water is now falling, and in three hours the danger will probably be past. Skinner's boarding and dwelling houses are all destroyed. The inmates had not a moment's warning. The water came like an avalanch, sweeping down wellbuilt houses. Whole families were killed. Skinner's silk mill, at Williamsburg, filled with girls, all ages, was swept away and all lost.
