the distance that freight and passengers

are transported. Those who are familiar with shipping and receiving freights know full well, that they now have two or three times as much for transportation at intermediate stations as is paid at the termination of routes, or double what we would

be required to pay if the proper change was made. There is no one who can gainsay the inportance of this matter to the public.

Our Lumbermen need cheap freights as much as they do cheap money, to realize a margin on their operations. Our coal fields to be opened, want cherp transportation to market which when guaranteed, will place them on an

equal footing with other localities, that heretofore have had the advantage of competing lines and cheap freights. Manufactures also might be fostered, encouraged and sustained with a fair
