NORMAL SCHOOL APPROPRIATIONS' -The appropriation made to the State normal schools by the last Legislature is \$60,000. The commission named in the act to distribute the money, the Governor, the Attorney General and the Superintendent of Common Schools have apportioned it as follows: Millersville, \$15,000 Edinboro, \$5,000, Mansfield \$5,000: Kutztown, \$10,000, Bloomsburg, \$5,000 West Chester, \$10,000, Shippensburg, \$5,000 Sagamore, \$5,000, Including these amounts hs several schools have now received irectly from the State appropriations as follows: Millersville \$30,000, Edinbcro, \$30,000 Mansfield, \$40,000, Kutztown . \$35,000, Bloomsburg, 40, 000, West Chester, \$35,000; Shippensburg, \$40,000; Sagamore, \$30,000. Another appropriation of 40,000 will be necessary to place each of the other schools on the same basis with those that have received the largest approriations-\$40,000 each.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION in New York begins on the first of the year. The opinion is general that the new law will work well and will be of great benefit to thousands of children who are now growing up in pagan ignorance and crime. In New York city it is the intention to enforce the law with energy and the police force will be employed to obtain much of the essential information. It is intended to gather in from the streets, slums and workshops of the city all children between the ages of eight and fourteen and compel their parents if they have any, to send them to school for a term of fourteen weeks in the year, eight weeks of which must be consecutive or they may be instructed at home fourteen weeks, which will serve the purpose of the law equally well. The law provides specifically that the branches which all children of whatever sex or social rank must learn shall be, spelling, reading, writing, English grammar, geography and arithmetic.—Pittsburgh Telegraph.
