An Act.

Below we give an act of Assembly which will doubtless be of interest to many of our readers:

To provide for the erection of watering troughs for the use of horses and cattle, on the public roads of this Commonwealth:

WHEREAS, for the want of convenient watering places on the public highways horses and cattle are frequent sufferers, therefore.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That under the sanction and supervision of supervisors of roads of the respective townships of this Commonwealth, any person or persons, who may erect and maintain in good repair, a public watering trough of not less than four feet in length, twelve inches in width, and nine mehes, in depth, in clear, of either wood, stone, or iron, and have pure clear water concinually running into the same, by pipes, or otherwise, or the water supplied by a hand pump, upon the side of public highway, created of sufficient height and of easy access, suitable for watering horses and cattle and approved by the supervisors of each township, shall be entitled to receive from the road fund thereof the sum of three dollars per annum on the payment of his or her respective road
