Fresh Outrages in Luzerne—An Immense Quantity of Coal on Hand.

Wilkesbarre, May 7.—Yesterday afternoon Alderman Ziegler, of Kingston, which is across the river from here, issued several warrants for the arrest of a party of men for threatening and beating some miners who had been working without the consent of the union. They threatened them with certain death in case they persisted in "blacklegging," and not contented with giving them a good beating, they went so far as to smash their windows and destroy their furniture. Some of the men were seriously injured by the mob. A few of them have been arrested and lodged in jail. But this seems to have had no effect upon them inasmuch as to-day a crowd numbering about one hundred men marched up and down in front of the houses occupied by those who are to work, exhibiting an effigy of a blackleg placed on a pole, and fired shot after shot at it, stopping occasionally to warn the men that such would be the fate of all who went to work after to-morrow.

Parish has carried out his threat of taking away the pumps to the very letter, and the mines are now left to fill up with water as they will. Still there seems no disposition on the part of the operators or the men to hasten the end of the suspension. The best miners are leaving the region in considerable numbers, some going to other coal fields, others striking out for the Pacific coast, while not a few are returning to the old country. There will be a meeting of the different delegates in this city to-morrow to determine what action they shall take. It is obvious that the number of men now on strike is so large as to preclude the possibility of their remaining idle much longer. Considerable parades are made of sums of money which have been forwarded to their assistance. But the amounts are quite insignificant when placed in comparison with the number to be supported therefrom. It is reliably reported that the Delaware and Hudson Coal Company have had a full force of men on this last month, and put in full time, and have mined 300,000 tons during that period, while the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Company have taken out 308,000 tons. The former company have also 500,000 tons at Honesdale all ready to ship when navigation opens. The Pennsylvania Company have also a large amount on hand, and these three companies claim that in sixty days they will be able to fill the market up, and then the miners may whistle for the increase of pay which they demand. Waterman & Beaver are determined to carry out their threat of ejecting the tenants from their houses as soon as the notified time for leaving expires. This will no doubt cause considerable trouble, and no doubt, the military will have to be summoned to their aid to carry out the plan of ejection.

ASSOCIATED PRESS ACCOUNT OF KINGSTON OUTRAGES

Wilkesbarre, Pa., May 7.—Last night was an exciting one in the mining regions around Kingston. A procession of from fifty to one hundred miners, with torpedoes and armed with guns, revolvers and clubs, marched to the dwellings of the men who are working in Hutchinson's and Payne's mines and gave them notice to quit work or the penalty would be death. The gang were very noisy and threatening, but did not damage any buildings or maltreat any person. They carried with them an effigy of a "blackleg" which they took to a grove, where it was hanged by the neck to a tree, and the crowd emptied their firearms at it. The result has been that Payne's men refused to return to work this morning. Three of Hutchinson's men, while on their way to the shaft, were followed by a gang of women and children, and pelted with stones until they were forced to seek safety in flight. The constable into whose hands the warrants for the arrest of the persons who beat McHale were placed, was unable to serve them to-day.

To-morrow a posse will accompany him, and serious trouble is expected. A miner in that section named Thomas, who had been a ringleader in the intimidations, was arrested to-day and is now in jail. Mr. Ferrish is carrying out his word in regard to the Sugar Notch mines. The pumps and machinery from numbers 9 and 10 were removed to-day. It has no effect upon the men. They laugh at the idea of being forced to yield as long as assistance comes as easily as it has so far. The men at the Upper Wyoming region are anxious to have the strike continue here for two reasons—it makes more work there, and if the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Companies are compelled to advance prices all the others will also. The works of the Delaware and Hudson, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western and the Pennsylvania Coal Companies are now run at their full capacity. The mines of this section will hold a meeting to-morrow to consider the situation.
