cast at any election hereafter held in the State shall be written or printed on plain, white paper, without any distinguishing marks or other embelishment thereon, except the names of the candidates and the offices for which they are voted for, and Inspectors of Elections shall refuse all ballots offered in any other description: Provided, Nothing herein shall disqualify the voter from writing his name on the back thereof.' The Supreme Court of the State, we believe, is composed mainly of Demo-

crats, and, unlike the Court of Moses, in South Carolina, would refuse to entertain any motion looking to a revision of the ballots.
