Indian Battle.

Deadwood, D. T., February 26 .- A sores. courier who arrived from the military camp forty miles north of this city today, reports that Lieutenant Cummings, with company C, attacked a small Indian camp on the 23d inst. The Indians fled through the ravines, leaving all their property. Lieutenant Cummings captured a large herd of sheep, a number of cattle, sixteen ponies and Indian robes and blankets. After the soldiers had gone into camp at night the Indians returned and made an attack, which was promptly repulsed. One Indian was killed. None of the whites were injured. Indian signal fires are seen in all directions. The command is moving south to-day to meet a supply of rations which has been sent from here.
