They were accompanied by Spotted Tail and Joe Morrille, a scout, who sent this information to Captain Vroom, of the 3d cavalry, at Deadwood City. Crazy Horse with the Cheyennes, Ogalallus and Arapahoes Cheyennes, Ogalallus and Arapahoes are coming in on the west side of the Black Hills. Sitting Bull with his small party were followed to the mouth of Powder river but could not be communicated with, and have gone towards British Columbia.
