Elk County S. S. Convention.

This convention met at Wilcox, in the chapel of the Dutch Reformed Church at four o'clock P. M. of the Sth inst., and was called to order by Mr. A. B. Preston, chairman of the Elk Co. S. S. Association Committee. The Convention was organized by electing the Rev. Robt White, of St. Mary's, Chairman, and H. M. Campbell, of Wilcox, Secretary.

The following constitution for the Elk Co. S. S. Association was sub-

mitted by Mr. A. B. Preston, and was adopted and signed by all present.

CONSTITUTION. ART 1. The name of this organization shall be The Elk County Sabbath School Association.

ART 2. The object of this association shall be to promote the Sunday School work of the county, co-operating with both union and church schools already established, and rendering assistance in establishing others whenever practicable.

ART. 3. Pastors of the churches, officers and Teachers of the Sunday Schools, and such other persons as are actively engaged in Sunday School work in this county, may become members of this association by subscribing its constitution.

ART. 4. The officers of this association shall be a President, two vice Presidents, a County Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Secretary for each Township or Borough, or other convenient districts, to be elected at the annual meetings of the association. ART. 5. The duties of the officers of this association shall be such as customarily devolve upon like officers.

Secretaries being to collect and transmit to the county Secretary, in time for his annual report the statistics of the Sabbath Schools of their respective

districts. ART. 6. The annual meetings of this association shall be held at such places as may be chosen in the month of May in each year. Other meetings may be held as ordered by the association or its executive committee. ART. 7. ciation during the year. ART. 8. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual meet-
