Washington, December 14,-The Post Office Department has infomation that a case of alleged improper sale of stamps by the postmaster at Stockton, Me., which was carried before the U.S. Court at Portland as a test case, has resulted in the conviction and sentence of J. F. Frye, the postmaster. Judge Fox is reported as holding that, under present postai laws, postmasters making illegal sales of stamps by discount or exchange for goods can be punished. The department will take advantage of this fact to prosecute other postmasters guilty of like offenses.

New York December 14 .- A new telegraph company that is supposed to be in opposition to the Western Union has filed articles of incorporation with the County Clerk here. It is to be called the Continental, and its first wires are to be stretched between New York and Philadelphia. Its capital is to be ten millions of dollars, of which James L. Shaw and N. J. Baldwin, of Philadelphia, take 160 shares each. and Albanus I.. Worthington, of Trenton, 80,000 shares. The shares are twenty-five dollars. Alfred Nelson, former treasurer of the Atlantic and Pacific, is President and James G Smith manager.

New York, December 14.-The grand jury to-day indicted Sherman Boardwell, president of the broken Clairmont Savings Bank, for perjury in swearing to bank statements that were untrue or falsified. This evening detectives from the District Attorney's office arrested Boardwell in his mansion, at No. 405 Bergen avenue, up for the night. Bordwell lived in great style.

Newark, December 18,-The excite ment to-day extended to all the savings banks, but subsided toward night. The Newark Savings Institution pald all applicants eighteen per cent. The amount drawn was \$25,000 and \$2,400 were newly deposited. The managers express confidence that the depositors will ultimately lose nothing. The Howard Institution paid depositors in full as fast as they appeared and the managers have determined to continue payments as rapidly as their clerical force will allow. The Dime Bank cheeked their run by requiring three months' notice and hope to re- feature alone makes sume payments soon if not suddenly compelled to convert securities. The German Bank, a small institution is not yet affected, but will adopt the three months' notice rule if pressed.

The Value of Bank Books in Claims

A dispatch from Binghampton, New

York, is as follows: "For two years past the decision in a case involving the validity of a savings bank as a claim for deposits certified therein has been awaited with considerable interest in this community, and the verdical has just been made public, having been de livered sealed, at the term of the supreme court in this city last week, to Judge Martion. The circumstances are there: A man named John Erwin died in the summer of 1874, leaving some little property. and a deposit of \$250 in the Binghampton savings bank. He made a will bequeathing all his property to a Mrs. Bram. and making her the sole executrix of the will, Some months after his death Mrs Bram ap plied to the bank for the money. The bank book, she said, had been lost. It was shown that she was the legatee of Erwin. and also the custodian of his will, the money was paid to her, she first giving an indemnity bond with two sureties. In March, 1875, a Mrs Hasbrouck presented the lost bank book to the bank and demanded the money. The bank relused to pay her the amount, and she began the pro ceedings just concluded. She claimed that Erwin had made her a present of the book only a short time before he died. There was no proof that he had done so, but the jury's verdict is that Mrs. Hasbrouck is entitled to the principal and interest of the amount involved-\$:08,28. The bank will hold the sureties on the indemnity band given by Mrs. Bram for the amount."
