Representative Harmer, of Pernsylvania, will introduce in the National House of Representatives, a bill for the organization of a reserve to the regular army to develop the agricul-tural and mineral becourses of the pub-lic domain, afford relief, provide the means of support and secure home steads to the unemployed working-The preamble to the bill sets forth that, by reason of the immense over-production in the various branches of manufacture, it becomes imperative that other channels of industry be provided whereby the large numbers of idle artisars, laborers and mechanics can find employment, and that the development of the agricultural and mineral resources of the public domain, under the auspices of the General Government, offers the speedlest and most practicable method to bring about this result. The bill provides that the President be author--Sheriff Oyster drives a staving pair ized to accept the services of volunteer artisans, laborers and mechanics, not exceeding at any one time over 50,000 men, who shall serve for not more than five nor less than two years. They must be citizens of the United States, and fitted for the labor required; are to be subject to the rules and reserve. are to be subject to the rules and regulations of the army; will be formed into regiments of infantry and placed on a footing as to pay, allowance, arms and equipment as soldiers of the regular army. They will be required to drill at stated times, so as to become familiar with and proficient in the use of arms; will be subject to the orders of the President and Secretary of War for the suppression of Indian insurrections, protection of Government protection, protection of Government protection, invasion from foreign Nations, or rebellion against the authority of the United States; are to be furnished with free transportation rom the place of enlistment to the several reservations. Each man will be allowed 160 acres of land, and at such times as he is not on military duty will be engaged in agricultural and mineral pursuits; after an honorable discharge will be entitled to receive a patent from the Government to the land. his sad affliction. -The Titusville Herald of Jan. 6 says that the intense cold and pressure develops paraffine in crude petroleum, and thus we find that the pipe lines of the oil region have become so clogged with paraffine since the advent of the Arctic wave, that they cannot transport oil in sufficient quantity to keep pace with the production. It is claimed that in the northern oil field alone from five to eight thousand barrels of oil are going to waste daily from this cause. In some cases the freezing is not so great as in others. This is owing to the oll being pumped through pipes sunk in the ground. The drilling and pumping wells have also in many cases been brought to a stand still, partly because the streams which feed the boilers are frozen dry, partly because the men cannot stand or work in the derricks with the thermometer at or below zero.
