Washington Letter: [From our regular correspondent.]

Washington, D. C., February 20. Senator McCreery's speech in favor of the transfer of the Indian Bureau to the War Department, was the great event of the week. Senator McCreery has not made many speeches in Congress, but he is known as one of the ablest debaters in either House, and the announcement that he was to discuss the Indian question brought out the largest audience of the session. The galleries were packed, and every available space of the floor below occupied by members of the House and others, who enjoy the privileges of the Senate Chamber. The speech itself was a pointed and exhaustive presentation of the transfer side of the controversy. One of the hardest hits in the speech was its reference to the Cloak of the Church so wickedly used to cover outrages and rascalities. The various agencies are supposed to be assigned to, and in a measure under the control of different denominations. legal claims against the same will and the agents appointed are understood to represent the church to which the particular agency belongs. Church influence is required to secure an appointment, and the whole business is managed in the name of Christianliy. Yet what a burlesque and what a disgrace it all is?

Mr. Spoffard, the Librarian, has just made an important addition to the Congressional Library. The bound volumes of newspapers in the Library of Congress now number over 5,000, and in this collection is a set of the London Gazette from 1665 to 1879. The question of providing additional room for the immense and magnificent collection of books now under Mr. Spoffard's charge, is still agitating the Congressional mind, but of far it is all talk. The building of which so much has been said, is still
