Important to Township Auditors.

Township auditors too often neglect the publication of the township accounts. This is required by law, and penalties are affixed for neglect. Cases have come before the courts in several counties of the State, and the auditors have been fined for neglect. The substance of several laws on the subject is

as follows: FIRST. The auditors are required in each borough and township to settle the accounts thereof, and to publish the same not only in newspapers, but also by written or printed statements put up in the most public places in the borough and township, as soon after the close of the fiscal year, which is on the first Monday in April,


