# Gapes in Poultry.

ITS CAUSE, PREVENTION AND CURE. I am in receipt of several letters insubject to. In raising chickens, there is one particular point that I insist upon to insure success, absolute cleanliness. Preventives are far better than cures. Show me a flock of young languages, chickens with the gapes, and, nine times out of ten, they have access to some mud hole, or pool of filthy water. Give them clean water. Just imagine Poultry want care and attention as well as your cow, horse, or any other live stock. Every poultry breeder should have a bottle of the Douglass mixture on hand. It is very easily made and consists of one-half pound of sulphate of iron, one ounce of sulphuric acid and two gallons of water. Give a teaspoon of this in even half pint of water

In the fatal disease caused by the presence of the gapes, worms appear anusually prevalent. I have found no turpentine. Take a hen's feather, make a pointed end, but leave about two inches of the feathers as they are; dip it in spirits of turpentine and run it down the chicken's or fowl's throat; turn it around three or four times, then draw out the feather and you will find it filled with small worms. One or two applications may be regarded as a cure. I have seen the roupe, poultry itch, leg weakness, and poultry cholera; of which I shall speak in some future letter. I have seen all
