It would be well to watch the cellars carefully during the coming Winter for all manner of decayed vegetables. A little sanitary regulation about the house and vicinity will repay our readers in the enjoyment of better health and reduced doctor bills.

-The debt reduction for the current month will be large according to appearances at the close of business in Washington on Monday. The receipts so far have been \$26,000,000, and the ordinary disbursements, \$14,000,-000. In addition to this the interest payments for the month which have to be substracted amount so far to \$3,-700,000. This leaves with the returns of two days to count, something like \$9,000,000 surplus for the month.
