Post-Office Boxes.

The postoffice department has just issued a new peremptory Sider in regard to box rent, in which the public is inferested. Box remis must be paid for one quarter fu advance, and postmasters are prohibited from placing mail matter in boxes and drawers unless such payments are made as directed. A new set of form books has been furnished, by which it is proposed to hold postmasters to a more strict observance of this rule than has been done in the past. Furthermore, the department inspectors are directed to visit the postoffices, and taking worth 10 cents; ladies' Newport caps charge of these form books, satisfy themselves that the rule is strictly enforced. Any postmaster who permits the use of boxes and drawers until he has actually received payment for rent of the same, will be reported to the department.
