Notes of the Bank of Maryland, having been lately discovered in circulation, and on tracing the same were sound to come from the back parts of Virginia, where they probably first issued; to avoid imposition it is thought necessary to give the following description of them, by which they may readily be detected.

They have the letter D, for their alphabetical mark, at the left hand side of the Note.

The paper on which they are printed is more soft and tender, the strokes of the letters, in the engraving are in general stronger, and

The signature William Patterson, is badly done, the strokes of the letters, are shiff and labored, and appear to be painted over with the pen, as well as the slourishing of the name.
