Lachawannock.

A LARGE body of LAND on this river

Another means of connection with Phi-
ladelphia, is by the Delaware, from which

terest with that of the inhabitants, are dis-
posed to erect works of public utility, open
roads, &c. and in every ten miles square, a
tract of one hundred acres is allotted for a
School, and one hundred acres for the first
resident clergyman of any denomination of
Christians.

the City of Washington—Two beautiful de-
signs are already selected for the entire front
on two of the public squares; from these
drawings, it is proposed to erect two centre
and four corner buildings, as soon as possible
after this Lottery is sold, and to convey them
when complete, to the fortunate adventurers,
in the manner described in the scheme for
the Hotel Lottery. A neat deduction of five
per cent. will be made to defray the neces-
sary expenses of printing, &c. and the sur-
plus will be made a part of the fund intended
for the National University, to be erected
within the City of Washington.

The drawing will commence as soon
as the Tickets are sold, or at all events on
Monday, the 22nd of December next: The
money prizes will be payable in thirty days
after it is finished, and any prizes for which
fortunate numbers are not produced within
twelve months after the drawing is closed are
to be considered as given towards the fund
for the University, it being determined to
settle the whole business in a year from the
ending of the drawing and to take up the
bonds given as security.

The real securities given for the payment
of the Prizes, are held by the President and
two Directors of the Bank of Columbia, and
are valued at more than half the amount of
the Lottery. The drawing will be under
the management of 24 gentlemen approved
by the commissioners for the City of Wash-
ington, for the time being, and acting on
oath.
