Division Orders,
September 10, 1794.
Such lieutenant colonels,
Commandants, or Commanding Officers of Corps belonging to the first Division of the Militia of Pennsylvania as have not yet formed the same into classes, are ordered immediately to do it; and should any of the officers, non-commissioned officers, or privates belonging to the respective battalions or corps (whose turn it is to march) be so lost to the duty they owe their government as to refuse going on the present service, it is expected such officers will immediately resign their commissions, the non-commissioned officers be disgraced, and every exertion made by the commanding officers of the corps and company to supply the defaulters place with volunteers.

The drums and fifes belonging to the several battalions will parade with their Drum and Fife-Majors daily, and practice through the city, or in such parts of the country as may be fixed on by the commanding officer; their pay will be made good by the State, until Wednesday the 17th instant, on which day the respective commands will march from this city and parade at the Governor's Marquee.

This Lottery will afford an elegant specimen of the private buildings to be erected in the City of Washington—Two beautiful designs are already selected for the entire fronts on two of the public squares; from these drawings, it is proposed to erect two centre and four corner buildings, as soon as possible after this Lottery is sold, and to convey them when complete, to the fortunate adventurers, in the manner described in the scheme for the Hotel Lottery. A net deduction of five per cent. will be made to defray the necessary expences of printing, &c. and the surplus will be made a part of the fund intended for the National University, to be erected within the City of Washington.

The drawing will commence as soon as the Tickets are sold, or at all events on Monday, the 22nd of December next: The money prizes will be payable in thirty days after it is finished, and any prizes for which fortunate numbers are not produced within twelve months after the drawing is closed are to be considered as given towards the fund for the University, it being determined to settle the whole business in a year from the ending of the drawing and to take up the bonds given as security.

The real securities given for the payment of the Prizes, are held by the President and two Directors of the Bank of Columbia, and are valued at more than half the amount of the Lottery. The drawing will be under the management of 24 gentlemen approved by the commissioners for the City of Washington, for the time being, and acting on oath.

COMMUNICATION.
The contemptible insinuation in the Centinel respecting the Republican Societies, as influencing the French in the late capture, are too derogatory to be seriously noticed; such remarks shew evidently to what an infamous situation they were reduced. As to the names of the citizens who compose the Republican Society, and their proceedings, they may be known to any man who will call on the Secretary for a perusal of the books. The honest merchant, industrious tradesman, and independent citizen who have subscribed to the articles, are willing to meet their opposers face to face—whenever it is necessary.

This the public may be assured of, that the Republican Societies do not consist of Federal Officers, who have four times what they earn; or a group of Bankers, Sharppers and Speculators, who would sacrifice the honor and happiness of the people, to promote their own private interest.

BALTIMORE, August 29.
The following extract of a letter from a gentleman in France, dated July 1st, was obligingly handed to us, by a respectable character of this town.

“The French convoy arrived the 14th of June, in the best state, not a vessel missing, with 15 rich prizes, most Indianmen—At one instant, couriers were sent to all the different towns of France with civic crowns—Joy was universal.
“The army of the north consists of 160,000 men. The English have been cut to pieces in the vicinity of Ostend. The French take no prisoners. No quarters are received from the English. The French troops are encamped within a few leagues of Mayence. The king of Prussia has notified England he could no longer keep the field, if he did not receive from them full pay for 32,000 men—this is positive.

“Ten ships of the line have sailed from Toulon, and are cruising in the Mediterranean. The Poles have slain 40,000 Ruffians in the field, and made 7000 prisoners at Grodno—the same fate followed them in the Ukraine. A convention is meeting at Warsaw—they copy the French entirely. The Turks take a part with the Poles, and have four great armies in full march to the frontiers of Russia and Austria. Sweden and Denmark are laid to declare in favor of Poland next spring.

“The Nancy, Capt. Smith, of Baltimore, is brought into port. Twenty new sail of the line and twenty frigates will be ready by the end of this year. Mr. Munroe, in the Cincinnati, is arrived safe.”

LANCASTER, Sept. 10.
Beware of Counterfeit BANK NOTES
On Thursday last were apprehended in this borough several persons, for passing Counterfeit Bank Notes, in imitation of the Notes of the Bank of the United States. They are of the denomination of Five and Ten Dollar Bills; the paper and engraving part are done tolerably well and such as would deceive even a close observer, but the writing or filling up part and the signatures of Thomas Willing, and John Kean are performed clumsily, and may be easily distinguished by a comparison with the genuine bill. The persons apprehended and in goal are five all of whom had a hand in passing or attempting to pass some of the bills; but it seems that a ROBERT Hancock and one William Shaw, among them are more principally concerned in the business; Hancock is from Birmingham in England where he resided for upwards of 36 years; about three years ago he came over to this country, but lately went over to revisit his native country and returned about six weeks ago. The circumstances are strong to suppose that he has brought with him a quantity of Bank Notes, to be filled
