This Lottery will afford an e.egant specimen of the private buildings to be erecked in the City of Washington—Two beautiful designs are already sele cited for the entire fronts on two of the public squares; from these drawings, it is proposed to creek two centre and tour corner buildings, as soon as possible after this Lottery is fold, and to convey them when complete, to the fortunate adventurers, in the manner described in the scheme for the Hotel Lottery. A nest deduction of five per cent. will be made to desiray rise necessary expenses of printing, &c. and the surplus will be made a part of the fund intended for the National University, to be erecked within the City of Washington.

The drawing will commence as soon as the Tickets are fold, or at all events on Monday, the 22nd of December next: The money prizes will be payable in thirty days after it is finished, and any prizes for which fortunate numbers are not produced within twelve months after the drawing is closed are to be considered as given towards the fund for a University, it being determined to settle the whole business in a year from the ending of the drawing and to take up the bonds given as security.

The real securities given for the payment of the Prizes, are held by the President and two Directors of the Bank of Columbis, and are valued at more than half the amount of the Lottery. The drawing will be under the management of 24 gentlemen approved by the commissioners for the City of Washington, for the time being, and acting on oath.

DUTIES

Payable by law on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize imported into the United Seates of America, after the last day of June 1794, distinguishing the rates payable on those imported in ships or vessels of the United States—and the rates payable in foreign ships or vessels, including the additional duties, to which the respective articles are liable.

#### Pennsylvania Militia.

THE MILITIA, now preparing to af-

THE MILITIA, now preparing to affemble at the different places, appointed by the Governor, sorders, of the 13th inft. will have to furnish themselves with provisions for their march to the respective places of rendezvous, for which they will be paid the price allowed for the rations by the United States. On their arrival at the said places appointed for assembling, rations will be furnished them.

ARMS ACCOUTREMENTS, TENTS, and CAMP-KETTLES, will be furnished by the United States to the several corps, at the respective places appointed for them to assemble, on their commanding officer's making return of the officers and men composing their corps, as they may arrive, for which purpose in greatest expedition will be used to forward the necessary supplies.

FORAGE will also be provided for the cavalry and officers horses which are entitled to forage, and the same will be paid for at the established price, from the time of their collecting in their respective counties until their arrival at the several places appointed for assembling.

Each compleat company will be allowed a four horse waggon to carry their camp equipage; and the same for the field officers of each regiment; which the several commanding officers are requested to engage to serve for the expedition, and they will be paid at the rate of thirty-five shillings per day for each four horse waggon, and driver, furnishing their own substituce. To accommodate them as far as possible, orage will be laid in at the different places appointed for assembling, and delivered at the prime cost to such as choose to apply for it; and in case the general arrangements should make it necessary to furnish them with forage after they leave Carlishe, an equitable rate will be settled in establishing the price of hire then to be allowed.

As the tents, with their poles, camp-kettles and equipage must in all events be conveyed in the waggons allowed to each corps, it will be necessary to refirse the loading waggons allowed to companies with baggage as much as possible.
