**General orders.**  
As a number of drafts are directed to join Colonel Gurney's Regiment, the Governor finds it expedient to postpone the march, directed for to-morrow morning, till 8 o'clock on Monday morning next, at which time (and not before) the Light Infantry Corps, the Grenadiers the baggage of Infantry, Grenadiers, and the Battalion, encamped at Peters's Farm, will march from that place by the middle ferry bridge to the Ridge Road, and thence by Norristown, Reading and Harburg, to Carlisle.

It is the Governor's orders that the adjutant-general take immediate measures, in concert with the Commanding Officers of the respective Corps, to organize the different Companies, Battalions, and Regiments of the quota of the city and county of Philadelphia, levying the same according to the proper proportion of officers and men.

This Lottery will afford an elegant specimen of the private buildings to be erected in the City of Washington—Two beautiful designs are already selected for the entire fronts on two of the public squares; from these drawings, it is proposed to erect two centre and four corner buildings, as soon as possible after this Lottery is sold, and to convey them when complete, to the fortunate adventurers, in the manner described in the scheme for the Hotel Lottery. A net deduction of five per cent. will be made to defray the necessary expences of printing, &c. and the surplus will be made a part of the fund intended for the National University, to be erected within the City of Washington.

The drawing will commence as soon as the Tickets are sold, or at all events on Monday, the 22nd of December next: The money prizes will be payable in thirty days after it is finished, and any prizes for which fortunate numbers are not produced within twelve months after the drawing is closed are to be considered as given towards the fund for the University, it being determined to settle the whole business in a year from the ending of the drawing and to take up the bonds given as security.

The real securities given for the payment of the Prizes, are held by the President and two Directors of the Bank of Columbia, and are valued at more than half the amount of the Lottery. The drawing will be under the management of 24 gentlemen approved by the commissioners for the City of Washington, for the time being, and acting on oath.
