



The real fecurities given for the payment of the Prizes, are held by the President and two Directors of the Bank of Columbia, and are valued at more than half the amount of the Lottery. The drawing will be under the management of 24 gentlemen apprived by the commissioners for the City of Washington, for the time being, and acting on oath.
