the Hotel Lottery. A net deduction of five
per cent. will be made to defray the neces-
sary expenses of printing, &c. and the sur-
plus will be made a part of the fund intended
for the National University, to be erected
within the City of Washington.

The drawing will commence as soon

Monday, the 22nd of December next: The
money prizes will be payable in thirty days
after it is finished, and any prizes for which
fortunate numbers are not produced within
twelve months after the drawing is closed are

for the University, it being determined to
settle the whole business in a year from the
ending of the drawing and to take up the
bonds given as security.

The real securities given for the payment
of the Prizes, are held by the President and
two Directors of the Bank of Columbia, and
are valued at more than half the amount of
the Lottery. The drawing will be under
the management of 24 gentlemen approved
by the commissioners for the City of Wash-
ington, for the time being, and acting on
oath.

It may be a tale of truth, for it is not un-
natural, and it is a tale of real distress—
Charlotte is the artifice of a teacher, re-
commended to a school from humanity ra-
ther than a conviction of her integrity of
the regularity of her former conduct, is en-
ticed from her governess, and accompanies
a young officer to America.—The marriage
ceremony, if not forgotten, is postponed,
and Charlotte dies a martyr to the incon-
stancy of her lover, and treachery of his
friend.—The situations are artless and af-

sionate; we should feel for Charlotte if such
a person ever existed, who, for one error,
scarcely, perhaps deserved so severe a pun-
ishment. If it is a fiction, poetic justice
