It may be a tale of truth, for it is not unnatural, and it is a tale of real distress—Charlotte by the artifice of a teacher, recommended to a school from humanity rather than a conviction of her integrity of the regularity of her former conduct, is enticed from her governess, and accompanies a young officer to America.—The marriage ceremony, if not forgotten, is postponed, and Charlotte dies a martyr to the inconstancy of her lover, and treachery of his friend.—The situations are artless and affecting—the descriptions natural and pathetic; we should feel for Charlotte if such a person ever existed, who for one error, scarcely perhaps deserved so severe a punishment. If it is a fiction, poetic justice is not, we think, properly distributed.

If it was necessary to make a declaration of their own principles, they would say, they are neither Tory nor republican.—They love liberty as English Whigs, and execrate every criminal act by which to noble a cause is endangered and disgraced.
