It may be a tale of truth, for it is not un-
natural, and it is a tale of real distress—
Charlotte by the artifice of a teacher, re-
commended to a school from humanity ra-
ther than a conviction of her integrity of
the regularity of her former conduct, is en-
dorsed by her governess, and accompanies
a young officer to America.—The marriage
ceremonies, if not forgotten, is postponed,
and Charlotte dies a martyr to the incon-
stancy of her lover, and treachery of his
friend.—The situations are artless and af-
fecting—the descriptions natural and pas-
sionate; we should feel for Charlotte if such
a person ever existed, who for one error,
scarcely perhaps deserved so severe a pu-
nishment. If it is a fiction, poetic justice
is not, we think, properly distributed.
