PROPOSALS will be receivday of March next, inclusively, for carrying the mails of the United States between Philadelphia and the city of New York—Philadelphia and Baltimore—Baltimore and Alexandria—and Philadelphia and Pittlburgh—the times of arrival to be as follow—

I. Philadelphia and New-Tork.

Receive the mail at Philadelphia every Monday, Tuefday, Wedneiday, Thurfday, Friday and Saturday at one o'clock in the afterneon—and deliver it at New-York (in wenty hours after, viz) every Tuefday, Wedneiday, Thurfday, Friday, Saturday and Monday at nine o'clock in the morning. Retruening, receive the mail at New-York every Tuefday, Wedneiday, Thurfday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, at one in the afternoon, and deliver it at Philadelphia (in nincteen hours, viz.) every Wedneiday, Thurfday, Friday, Saturday, Saturday, Monday and Tuefday, at eight o'clock in the morning.
