CARRIAGE OF THE PUBLIC MAILS.

PROPOSALS will be received at the General-Post-Office until the 3rfs day of March next, inclusively, for carrying the mails of the United States between Philadelphia and the city of New York—Philadelphia and Baltimore—Baltimore and Alexandria—and Philadelphia and Pittiburgh—the times of arrival to be as follow—

1. Philadelp in and New-Yo k. Receive the mail at PHILADELPHIA every Monday, Tuefday, Wednefday, Thurfday, Friday and Saturday at one o'clock in the af-ternoon---and deliver it at New-York (in ternoon---and deliver it at New-York (in twenty hours after, viz.) every Tuefday, Wednefday, Thurfday, Fr'day, Saturday and Monday at nine o'clock in the morning. Ro-TURNING, receive the mail at New-York every Tuefday, Wednefday, Thurfday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, at one in the afternoon, and deliver it at Philadelphia (in nin cteenhours, viz.) every Wednefday, Thurfday, Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuefday, at eight o'clock in the morning.

2. Philadelphia and Baltimore.
Persons offering proposals re desired to flate on what terms they will carry this mail three imes a week, and on what terms they will carry it fix times a week.

Note I. The contracts for carrying these Mails will be made to commence on the 15th day of April next (exc pt the mail No. 4, the carriage of which shall commence on Satrday the 18th day of April) and continue in force until the 1st day of April 1799.

Note 2. Should the hours of receiving and delivering these Mails be found inconvenient to the public, the Post-Master-General, may at any time change them; provided that if such changes would prove injurious to the contractors, they shall not be made without an adequate compensation previously stipulate.

Note 3. For every quarter of an hour's delay, not exceeding twelve quarters, and for every hour's delay thereafter, fübfequent to the times preferibed for delivering the three first mails at the Post-Offices in New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Alexandria; the contractors shall forfeit one dollar; and for every hour's delay in delivering the fourth mail at Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, respectively, they shall forseit one dollar. NOTE 4. The contractors shall be refron-ic for the fidelity of the persons, to a home cy entrust the mails.
