



By Mrs Rowson, of the New-Theatre
Philadelphia.

[The rapid sale of the First Edition of
this interesting novel, in a few months,
is the best proof of its merit.]

It may be a tale of truth, for it is not un-
natural, and it is a tale of real distress.—
Charlotte by the artifice of a teacher, re-
commended to a school from humanity rather
than a conviction of her integrity of
her regularity of her former conduct, is en-
joyed from her governess, and accompanies
a young officer to America.—The marriage
ceremony, if not forgotten, is postponed,
and Charlotte dies a martyr to the incon-
sistency of her lover, and treachery of his
friend.—The descriptions are artless and af-
fecting—the descriptions natural and pa-
thetic; we would feel for Charlotte if such
a person ever existed, who for an error,
scarcely, perhaps deserved to receive a pu-
nishment, if it is a fiction, poetic justice
is not, we think, properly distributed.
