The following is the account given of her situation, by a person who went on board for the purpose of examining it. The brig lays on her starboard side, her lee coamings being nearly under water at low water; she is supposed to be bilged, there is about six and a half feet along side at low water; no great difficulty is apprehended in getting her out, on the contrary, it is deemed a matter of certainty by the person who surveyed her, that she may be got off, her cargo consisting wholly of sugar.

And on the following day, at 10 o'clock, A. M. at John Rofs's wharf, all the sails, rigging, some spars, a caboose, and three anchors, which have been saved from said vessel, together with her long boat and yawl.
