LONDON, May 3.

Burning of the BOYNE Man of War.

At 11 o'clock on Friday morning, a fire broke out on board his majesty's ship Boyne, of 98 guns, which continued with irrepressible violence till five o'clock, when the magazine blew up.

The cause of this melancholy accident has not yet been clearly ascertained. The fire was first discovered in the after part of the ship, and is supposed to have proceeded from either a live cartridge from the muskets of the soldiers, who were exercising with small arms on the windward side of the ship, having lodged in the captain's or admiral's cabin, and caught something combustible, or from the funnel of
