A POEM, Sacred to the memory of GEORGE WASHINGTON,

Late Prefident of the United States, and Commander in Chief of the Armies of the United States.

Adapted to the 22d February 1800. BY RICHARD ALSOP.

THEREAS by an act of Co passed on the seventh day of May. in the year of our Lord one thouf and cight hundred, the President of the United orales is authorized to borrow, on behalf of the United States, from the Bank of the United States, or from any other body or bodies politic or corporate, or from any perfon or persons, and upon such terms and conditions as he shall judge most advan a-geous for the United States, a sum not exceeding Three Millions Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, so however, that no contract or engagement be made, which shall preclude the United States from reimburfing any fum or fums borrowed, at any time after the expiration of fifteen years from the date of such Loan. And WHEREas it is declared by faid act, that fo much as may be necessary of the sur lus of the duties on imports and tonnage, beyond the permanent appropriatious heretofore charged upon them by I w, shall be pledged and appropriated for paying the interest; and also for paying and discharging the principle sum or sum of all the monies which may be borrowed according to the term or terms which may be fixed purluant to the authority forefaid AND WHEREAS by the faid act the fath of the U States, is pledged to establish sufficient permanent revenues, for making up any deficie cythat may hereafter appear in the provisions be-fore mentioned for p ying the interest and principal sums or either of them or any mories which my be betrowed pursuant to the said act. AND WHEREAS, the PRESIDENT of the United States, did by an Act or Commiffion under his nand, dated the feventeenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred, authorize and empower the Secretary of the Treasury to borrow on behalf of the Uited States, any fum not exceeding in the whole Three Millions Five Hundred Thoufand Dollars, and to make such contract or contracts as should be necessary, and for the interest of the United States, in pur-

fuance of the act of Congress above recited.

NOW THEREFORE, the underlighted Secretary of the Treasury, in pursuance of the act of Congress and the authority from the President of the United States above mentioned—Doth Hereby, on behalf of the United States of America, contract and en-

gage in manner following, to wit:

1R. There shall be created a funded Capital Stock, to an amount hereafter to be defignated by the faid Secretary, but not ex-ceeding Three Millions Five Hundred Thou-fand Dollars, which Capital Stock shall be divisible into shares of one hundred dollars each, bearing interest, at eight per centum per annum, payable quarter yearly at the Treasury of the United States, or at the Loan Offices, where the said Stock may stand credited, une! the last day of December

in the year eighteen hundred and eight.
2d. After the lan day of December in the faid year one thousand eight hundred and eight, and after reasonable notice to the creditors, which shall be given by an advertisement in some public newspaper printed at the seat of the government of the United States, the said Capital Stock shall be redeemable at the pleasure of the United States, by the reimbursement of the whole fum or fums borrowed and which may con-flitute the faid Capital Stock, either at the Treasury of the United States, or at the Loan Offices where the fame may stand cre-

3d. The credits for the faid Capital Stock shall and may be separately certified in sums either for one hundred, four hundred, one thousand, four thousand, or ten thousand dollars, and the credits fo certified shall be ransferable by the creditors, or their attornies, at the Treasury and Loan Offices refpectively, in purfuance of the rules which have been or which may be established relative to the transfer of the funded Stock of the United States.

4th. A fufficient fum of the furplus of the duties on imports and tonnage beyond the permanent appropriations heretofore charged upon them by law—together with the faith of the United States, are hereby pledged for the fulfilment of this contract, in pursuance of, and according to the terms and conditions of the act of Congress herein
