IN an age when successful efforts have been made towards the improvement of the art of Thinking, and when Analysis has been discovered the universal, and tole good method to improve all sciences, and receive instruction in them, it may be a matter of a consistent that it has not been yet generally imbraced, and rendered the familiar method of learning. The extraordinary rise and progress of Chymistry, within a very sew years, are entirely due to an lysis; but there is an art on which it she yiel have first darted its beneficial rays, I alluse to the Teaching of Languages. In sach, Nature, this excellent analysh, was before our eyes guiting children in learning the language of their mother, and no shild ever failed in acquiring it, profiting surprisingly by her unerring lessons—Fully convinced by reason and experience, that the same method she pursues should be followed an nearly as possible, I adopted, in the course of my sinstructions, such books established on principles that least deviated from her simple distates. I soon perceived that the method acquired from these aids was but a very irregular and impersest. Analysis—I, thersore, resolved though with a very small considerace in my sender abilities, but animated with zeal or the improvement of those who may wish to learn French from me, to undertake the laborious and arduous task of writing a work, grounded on Analysical principles, which might comprehend what is wishedfor by thoseapplying them selves to the study of the living languages, and am happy to say, I have now nearly concluded it. It consists of three parts

The first, is a chosen Vocabulary of words most frequently used in speech, comaining 2,500—the most natural acceptation of each is determined by a phrase prefixed to its.

The second, contains the French verbs, both regular and irregular, from a new system in which the princip all difficulties attending conjugation are first explained, and of servations given on the use of each series and limite

as to enable the learner to express kimfell with precision.

The third, is a complete list of those words ferwant de lien on de complement de sensentre le autres pareles du discours: that is to say—forming the link or campletion of sense between the ather parts of speech, whose principal use is to establish in speech that connection between words, which already exists in the miad between ideas. I have also fully determined the sense and acception of these important words (which are divided into appropriate classes to fix them the easier in the memory) by annexing to each examples in French and English.

As I do not intend to publish the above, for some time, and in order, nevertheless, that my pupils may reap the same advantage without it. I hasten to inform those who may be induced to put themselves under my care, that half the time of school (the other half being devoted to other exercises) will be employed in exercising them in the following manner:

We first begin with the Vocabulary; each word of which will be pronounced in English then is French, to be repeated by one or more of the school lars; and a similar repetition of the phrases before mentioned will follow.

The rules given by Grammarians to actain this object are a most useless to us, and still more so the foreigners, struggling in vain to learn the true pronunciation of a lauguage with the help of dictionaries and Grammar alone. Though I conceive my scholars may attain in the above manner, the accurate pronounciation of the French language, yet strict attention is paid to their reading in approved authors before we begin the foregoing exercises.

I will pursue nearly the same method in imparting to them the contents of the two other divisions of my work. I cannot conclude this address with out thanking my Fellow-Citizens for the liberal encouragement I have experienced from them, these six years past, in my professional career, presuming that I may be permitted to say, that I have not been altogether undescring of it.
