French Tuition,
UPON AN ANALYTICAL PLAN.

NICHOLAS GOUIN DUFIEF,

Professor of the French Language,
BY THE HONOR of informing his Fellow-Citizens
of Philadelphia, that he will open his
School on Monday the 14th of September, at No.
5, fourth Fifth Street, and divide his hours of in-
struction in the following manner.

Attendance on Ladies and Gentlemen, at their
own houses, will be given as usual, from 9
o'clock in the morning till 4 in the afternoon.

His afternoon and evening school will begin
(every other day) from 4 to 6, and from 6 till 9.
Translations from either language into the
other, performed with accuracy, elegance, force
and dispatch.

N. B.—NICHOLAS G. DUFIEF, respectfully in-

friends or acquaintances, desirous of receiving les-
sons in that universal and improved language, to
meet at the same hour and place for mutual in-
struction—they may be assured it will be to their
advantage to do so, if they persevere with attention
the following.

To the Lovers of the French Language.

ADDRESS.

IN an age when successful efforts have been
made towards the improvement of the art of Think-
ing, and when Analysis has been discovered the
universal, and sole good method to improve all
sciences, and receive instruction in them, it may
be a matter of astonishment that it has not been
yet generally embraced, and rendered the familiar
method of learning. The extraordinary rise and
progress of Chymistry, within a very few years,
are entirely due to analysis; but there is an art on
which it should have first darted its beneficial rays,
I allude to the Teaching of Languages. In fact, Na-
ture, this excellent analysis, was before our eyes
guiding children in learning the language of their
mother, and no child ever failed in acquiring it,
proving surprisingly by her unerring lessons—
Fully convinced by reason and experience, that
the same method she pursues should be followed as
nearly as possible, I adopted, in the course of my
instructions, such books established on principles
that least deviated from her simple dictates. I soon
perceived that the method acquired from these aids
was but a very irregular and imperfect Analysis—
I, therefore, resolved though with a very small
confidence in my slender abilities, but animated
with zeal for the improvement of those who may
wish to learn French from me, to undertake the
labourious and arduous task of writing a work, ground-
ed on Analytical principles, which might com-
prehend what is wished for by those applying them-
selves to the study of the living languages, and
am happy to say, I have now nearly concluded it.
It consists of three parts.

The first, is a chosen Vocabulary of words most
frequently used in speech, containing 2500—the
most natural and proper of each is determined by
a phrase prefixed to it.

The second, contains the French verbs, both regu-
lar and irregular, from a new system in which
the principal difficulties attending conjugation are
first explained, and observations given on the use
of each tense, illustrated by proper examples, so
as to enable the learner to express himself with
precision.

The third, is a complete list of those words fre-
quent de lieu, ou de complement de sens entre les autres parties
du discours; that is to say—forming the link or comple-
tion of sense between the other parts of speech, whose
principal use is to establish in speech that connec-
tion between words, which already exists in the
mind between ideas. I have also fully determined
the sense and acceptation of these important words
(which are divided into appropriate classes to fix
them the easier in the memory) by annexing to
each examples in French and English.

As I do not intend to publish the above, for some
time, and in order, nevertheless, that my pupils
may reap the same advantage without it, I hasten
to inform those who may be inclined to put them-
selves under my care, that half the time of school
(the other half being devoted to other exercises)
will be employed in exercising them in the fol-
lowing manner.—

We first begin with the Vocabulary; each word
of which will be pronounced in English then in
French, to be repeated by one or more of the scho-
lars; and a similar repetition of the phrases, before
mentioned will follow.

It is worthy of observation, that in our infan-
cy, and as we advance in years, we learn the pro-
nunciation of our vernacular tongue, by pro-
nouncing word by word; and Analogy accomplish-
es what remains to be done, in order to acquire
the necessary knowledge of it. The rules given by
Grammarians to attain this object are almost
useless to us, and still more so to the foreigners,
struggling in vain to learn the true pronunciation
of a language with the help of dictionaries and
Grammar alone. Though I conceive my scholars
may attain in the above manner, the accurate
pronunciation of the French language, yet strict
attention is paid to their reading in approved au-
thors before we begin the foregoing exercises.

I will pursue nearly the same method in impart-
ing to them the contents of the two other divisions
of my work. I cannot conclude this address with-
out thanking my Fellow Citizens for the liberal
encouragement I have experienced from them,
thatsix years past, in my professional career pre-
suming that I may be permitted to say, that I have
not been altogether undervaluing of it.
