LETTER V.

Philadelphia, September 11, 1800. TO THOMAS JEFFERSON, Vice President of the United States.

SIR, EXPERIENCE, even in the domestic transactions of life, is of such great value, that we prize it with a miserly passion; but when in the public concerns of a nation, it is obtained by wading through difficulties, and hazarding many important risks, gratitude will erect a temple, consecrated to its worth, and the nation will bow in reverence to it, as the Genius, which shall guide its political career.

America has cause to build this Temple, Emerged from that Sea of distress, which succeeded the declaration of Peace, our country, by the wife and virtuous administration of General Washington, fast rose into consequence, and flourished in wealth and power—her commerce became extensive, and lucrative; a system of finance was established, which yielded a permanent and rich revenue, and the daring head of Faction, was proflated by the strong arm of government. Happy and contented at home, Europe contemplated us, as a nation enjoying unrivalled, all the numerous blessings of the purest liberty unalloyed by the evils of licentiousness. When that convulsion commenced, which shook to its center the old world, and yet threatens to deluge in blood, the richest plains of Europe, the demon of anarchy riding triumphant in the storm aimed an arrow at our repose, and happiness—but the arm of Washington, ever strong in his country's defence urged from its course the fatal weapon, and layed it harmless at his feet.

Too soon for us has Death snatched away our deliverer, for "Death loves a shining mark" but he bequeathed to his successor, the same shield with which he had defended his country. On the broad basis of his honorable system of Politics, was his successor placed, guarded on all sides, by the unbounded affections of a grateful people; no storm could effectually assail this high and secure station, for it was built on a rock immutable and fixed; the hearts of his countrymen.

Mr. Adams, with many firmness pursued the same wise policy. Power, wealth and glory accumulated in rich profusion around his happy country; in a moment, and the forces of his enemies would have been crushed. But an unlucky moment checked the current of national joy, and threw a temporary gloom over the face of affairs, the fluper of death succeeded the animated exertions of youthful vigour. I need not Sir recite to you those measures of the President, which bear strong marks of a change in his political sentiments, and to which I allude. They are known to every one, far be it from me to charge the President with intentional error. I believe otherwise; unlimited is the confidence I repose in his integrity, but Sir, to the majority of those who raised him to the chair of State, he certainly appears to have changed his political opinions, implied obligation seems not to have been fulfilled; here is cause enough in the minds of some people, to entertain suspicions, and by this example before your eyes, you ought to be governed. You have here a man, beloved, and revered through a long life, and of whose fidelity malice itself had never dared to doubt; in an instant bereft of a considerable portion of the confidence of his friends, for embracing some measures which at most are but doubtful. Whether this share of the public esteem is justly or unjustly withdrawn, I will not pretend to judge; for I am ignorant of the reasons, which influenced the President's mind. But that a diminution of confidence has taken place, is the fact, and this should serve as a way mark to you. If unfortunately it should prove your lot to be President of the United States; for your own sake, I advise you to fulfill every duty of Jacobinism, and suffer not the energy of its spirit, to die while in your keeping; plunder and the guillotine, are its worthy instruments, and you should not sparingly use them, accustom yourself to walk undismayed amid the tombs of murdered thousands, and the groans of dying Patriots; expell from posts of profit every worthy and honest man, and fill them with traitors, and rogues, you will then please your party, and preserve yourself. But repose not Sir, too much on your well established fame, think not that you may deviate one step from the path marked out by your party. In the fate of Mr. Adams you may read your own; he was sincerely beloved by his friends, but yet one unlucky step has weakened that affection. Mr. Adams was universally esteemed a worthy successor to the most illustrious of men—a rich assemblage of public honours decorated his character; and he would have lived in the annals of history an illustrious monument of a grateful country. But those recent acts which appear tinged with the spirit of democracy, will tear from his brow the encircling wreath and fully a name which might have dazzled a world.

Having examined into the principles and views of your party, my fellow-citizens know what they have to expect from the administration of President Jefferson. I have done my duty in endeavouring to expose it naked to their eyes; they will at least see enough to enable them to form a judgment; and in spite of ocular evidence, in spite of the tragic scenes which have been acted in France, in spite of the frequent attempts made to introduce its bloody reign into this country, my fellow-citizens should obstinately and wickedly prefer you for their ruler, I shall only have to lament that their wickedness will be so severely punished and their experimental knowledge so dearly bought. But, Sir, I cannot say and "pois of honor" for then the private station will be the post of honor.

your countrymen are too wise, too good, too religious (despite this as you please, I fill belongs to them) to elect Thomas Jefferson for their President. They have all felt the poisonous effects of suffering, but for a moment the introduction of Jacobinism into the Federal Government: they will vigilantly guard the executive door, and roughly expel from its threshold every presumptuous intruder the least tinged with its spirit. Experience has taught them a lesson, which is engraven on their hearts and never can be erased; for even supposing that you are not quite callous to every patriotic impression, that in a moment of reflection you might wish to spare the total ruin of your country—please not yourself, Sir, with the consoling hope that you dare to execute one honourable wish, for you dare not. The Pratorian band of Jacobins have the poignant of death ever ready for the deserter; their ALL is depending on the progress of Jacobinism, and their all will not be easily surrendered.

Deceive yourself no longer, Sir; throw off your miserable pretensions to the Presidency, founded on no virtue but your power to do harm; but which to Jacobins is a strong recommendation. Alk pardon of your offended country for having appeared in public so meanly attired, and I do not doubt but that to get rid of you they will forgive you. But take Sir, along with you in your retreat this lesson, they are perhaps my parting words—that the People of America will not raise to the Presidency the Chieftain of a Party which delights in human gore and lives but in the tempestuous sea of anarchy; they will not elect that man to rule over them who has sworn destruction to their form of government, and avowed his disbelief of the Christian Religion. No Sir, if your friends have told this, they have mistaken the character of your countrymen—for they love their constitution and reverence their religion. Keep still then, I conjure you in your retirement at Monticello—pursue your favorite study of natural history—dissect every fly that may buzz about your eyes; but spare the philosophic dismemberment of America; for if you stray from your element and intrude on the political stage, goaded to the extremes of indignation and despair, the people may speak a language too harsh for the delicacy of your nerves.

COLUMBUS.

BOSTON, Sept. 9,

BY THE BRIG ALERT,

Which has never arrived without furnishing fresh intelligence, we have received London papers to August 4, the latest by fourteen days. The most recent paper contains a report that a Peace between France and Austria was agreed to on the 29th of July. We have certain accounts that an armistice has been concluded between Generals Kray and Moreau. It is improbable that Buonaparte would have extended the cessation of hostilities if the Emperor had not exhibited a pacific disposition. The "dogs of war," on the continent are kennelled for a time. The continued active preparations for hostilities is ordinary policy, intended to secure a good bargain, and to guard against exigencies.

The various military arrangements, positions, &c. are now objects of secondary importance.

Negotiations between Russia, Prussia, Denmark, and Sweden, for supporting a neutrality by force of arms, is thought to be in considerable forwardness. The affair of the Danish frigate, however, must have occurred in consequence of particular orders from the court of Copenhagen. The British, a private article says, have so far resisted this unusual resistance as to have authorized the CAPTURE OF DANISH VESSELS.

We cannot find that the reports current yesterday of the departure of our Envoys from France, are supported by either printed or oral information.
