

THE LATEST FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

By the ship *Voltaire*, Capt. Bowen, arrived at this port in 40 days from Hamburg.

HAMBURG, September 1.

Letter from Copenhagen, the 26th August.

The Danish schooner which was sent to Petriburg with the account of the capture of the frigate *Freya*, is this moment returned. Of the dispatches which it brought, nothing is yet known; but greater activity and exertions in forwarding the preparations are observed. Four floating batteries of 24 pieces each are fitted and our road, and this day all the measures of defence for our harbour will be completed; outside of the Citadel they are now busied in throwing up a battery on the weakest part of the harbour. The strong batteries on the road are well mounted and the guards relieved every day. For the works on the Holm, they press the vagrants and all enrolled sailors are taken out of the merchantmen, and sailors from different districts are brought hither in waggon. The city militia is exercising and does duty on two city guards and each citizen is obliged at all events to have 20 cartridges in readiness.

Another letter from Copenhagen, of the same date, 26th August.

Although the preparations for defence become more serious every day, yet nothing of a hostile nature hath hitherto happened between us and the English. The merchants of this place as well as of Elsinour, having asked our governor as well as the English whether the merchant vessels could go out in safety? they got a satisfactory answer, and Admiral Dixon offered to give passports to those vessels, which would wish to depart from Elsinour, and would suffer themselves to be examined.

Meanwhile, the English Minister here, Lord Whitworth, has demanded a categorical answer to his proposals to our Court in a short time, and proposes to leave this city on Friday with his whole suit, the charge d'Affaires, Drummond excepted.

LOWER ELBE, August 28.

We hear from the Danish dominions, that all the regiments are likewise called in from the Dutchies. The regiments at Sleswig, it is said, are to march to Fönningen and the neighbouring coast. From Eckernförde and Rendsburg, the troops march towards Glückstadt, to which place more artillery has been sent, and where the fortifications are put into the best order. In several places on the coast, batteries are to be erected.

ELSINEUR, August 26.

We are yet in a total uncertainty whether we shall have peace or war with England. On the 24th in the evening, the Danish ships of war weighed twice, in order to go further into the harbour; the English immediately weighed likewise, and came to an anchor where the others did. It is said again that a Russian fleet is arrived in the road of Copenhagen. We expect here six hundred men more. A number of men which had been pressed here, are this moment transported to Copenhagen.

August 23.

Last night at ten o'clock a cry was made in the streets, that the English had attempted a landing between this and Hammers-Mühlah, where an English frigate lay. Every body was alarmed. A boat had actually approached the shore, but whether they were English or smugglers is not known. The Chasseurs fired on the boat and it retired.

HAGUE, August 10.

The day before yesterday the report spread already, that five English men of war, several frigates and a great number of transports had appeared off Catfard the day before, but now had come in sight of the harbour of Flushing. Yesterday morning a strong cannonade was heard off the mouth of the Meuse, and in the evening, information was received, that the English at break of day had attempted a landing on sea land, and on the side of the Briel, and actually had put a number of troops on flat bottomed boats, but that Adjutant General Charrier having marched rapidly towards the place of landing with a party of the Batavian troops, the English were forced to re-embark. On both sides ten men were killed in this affair. The intention of the English to get possession of a Batavian ship of the line, which lay there, was also frustrated.

FRANKFORT, August 26.

A new circumstance which is mentioned from Mentz proves but too certain that the Confil, whatever may be the issue of the present negotiation, looks upon the incorporation of Belgium and the left bank of the Rhine with France as unalterable, therefore these beautiful provinces must be looked upon as unavoidably lost to the German Empire and the house of Austria. An order signed by Buonaparte and Councillor Lacue, arrived at the Director of Domains, Goyon's, declares the intention of the First Consul to build a Hospital of Invalids in the neighbourhood of the City of Mentz, another near Brussels and a third near Lyons or Avignon. He will appropriate to these institutions 8 or 10 millions of National domains and has directed the citizen Goyon of Mentz to make a statement of the National domains in the department of Don-

nerberg, which may be applied for that purpose and transmit the same together with a report on several other points, at farthest on the 22d September, each of these three new institutions is calculated for 2000 invalids, so that besides the principle institution in Paris containing 4000 the First Consul will provide for 16,000 invalids.

From the unfortunate Swabia, whole troops of impoverished inhabitants emigrate to more peaceable countries; they are totally unable to give the French soldiers quartered upon them the least sustenance.

BOSTON, October 13.

Extract of letters from Tortola, received by the *Hannab*, arrived here yesterday.

TORTOLA, September 17.

"DEAR SIR,

"The seizure and detention of the barque *Galen*, Thomas Ashby, master, of Salem, and cargo, has no doubt made some noise in America, I therefore, as it is a matter of considerable importance, send you Judge Robinson's Reasons at large upon making his decree for further proof, not on account of the trade he had been carrying on, but very evident erasures in the several clearances, which gives reason to suppose the Revenue was defrauded, by the duties not being paid on the whole of the cargo. These erasures were in the word "twenty-five." It appears that Capt. Ashby cleared out, and paid duties at Trinidad upon "twenty-five" hogheads of sugar only, whereas he had actually on board "seventy-five"; and after leaving the port of Trinidad for America, by erasing the top of the letter "T," and converting the first stroke of the letter "w," in the word "Twenty" into an "o," altered the Clearance of twenty-five hogheads of sugar into that of seventy-five. Being met at sea by the British frigate *Severn*, Capt. Whitby, his papers were examined, and the fraud evidently detected; he was accordingly sent in here for adjudication."

Another letter of same date, in mentioning this scandalous transaction, observes;—"I am happy in informing you, that the *Galen* would have been acquitted, as to the trade she had been carrying on, the Judge thinking the trade at present indulged at Trinidad a just and politic measure, and which the Governor no doubt was authorized to allow."

This letter, after stating the same reasons for her detention, as are mentioned above, adds;—"The Judge therefore ordered further proof as to those matters, and Commissioners have been appointed at Trinidad to examine evidence thereon. By the captain's not proceeding to Trinidad to hasten the evidence, and to clear up this business, I very much suspect that it will appear, that the erasures must have been made by the captain, if so, the loss of vessel and cargo will be the consequence."

We have been furnished with the whole Proceedings of the Admiralty of Tortola, in the case of the *Galen*, but which on account of their length must be deferred till Thursday.

NEW YORK, October 16.

We are informed from undoubted authority, that on Wednesday evening last, Jack Bowler, alias Jack Ditcher, for whom a reward of three hundred dollars was offered by the Governor, surrendered himself to the civil authority, as being considered a chief in the insurrection lately meditated by the negroes—Gabriel, who was condemned to be hung on Tuesday last, received a respite from the Governor until to day; when he, together with fifteen others, five at the Brook near this place, five at the Four Mile Creek, and six (including Gabriel) at the Richmond gallows, will be executed.
