Pennsylvania Elections.

A letter from Lancaster, received yesterday evening, states, that the Gentlemen whose names are mentioned in the following Ticket, were elected by a majority of about four hundred and seventy votes: Congressmen: Thomas Bonde, Matthias Barton, John Hopkins, Richard Keys, Alexander Scott, Jacob Strickler, Daniel Buckley, Jeremiah Brown. Commissioner: Amos Slaymaker. Directors of the Poor House: George Muffer, James Morrison. Sheriff: Michael Rhine. Coroner: Emanuel Reigart, Jeremiah Mosher.

Colonel Presley Neville, was the Candidate at the late Election against Gallatin in the district from which G. formerly came. If the Federalists have united there can be no doubt of Colonel Neville's election. Several valuable saw mills, valued at 6000 pounds sterling, has been destroyed by fire in Charleston Neck, (South Carolina.) From Norfo'k we learn, that the fever has so far subsided as to render the publication of the deaths unnecessary. Well authenticated accounts from Suffolk, authorize a belief, that an infurrection was intended to have commenced in that neighbourhood about the time the discovery was made at Richmond. It is well ascertained, that on the 6th and 7th of September, there were 150 blacks assembled near whitlock's Mill, for the purpose of acting in concert with those of Richmond; Among them were 20 from Norfolk: These never left the neighbourhood until after it was known that the Richmond plan had failed. Some are committed to jail, but the evidence is supposed to be insufficient.

CONFIRMATION

Of the Capture of Curacao, and Massacre of Americans, by the French.

A gentleman from Kingston, arrived this morning, informs that on the 7th of Sept. about 80 Americans were massacred at Curacao by the French, along with a number of the Dutch inhabitants; the rest of the Americans and Dutch were shut up in the fort. Captain Hampton, of this port, was at Curacao, and had slipped out in a small boat, with a request from the Governor to the commander of the British frigate Nariad, then cruising off the harbour, requesting succour. The Capt. of the N. sent him all the marines he could spare, with whom Capt. H. returned. The Governor had also sent to Jamaica for assistance, and on the 20th ult. 3 frigates with 700 troops, left Kingston for Curacao. The French have about 1400 men, and have possession of the town and country—the fort commands the harbour—Gen. Rigaud is there.

Capt. B informs, that the ship Sally M'Pheron, of and for Philadelphia, failed the 20th Aug, and the ship General Lincoln, of Norwich, failed for Norfolk the 25th August, from Hamburg. Chance of Rhoad-Island from the coast of Guinea bound to Havannah, with 120 slaves on board, William Brown, master, and sent to Jamaica.

The Eliza and Mary from New-Orleans to New-York, is carried into Halifax. The English brig Minerva, Dobbins, from Montego-Bay.

Halifax papers to the 2d inst. were received at the office of the Daily Advertiser last evening by the schr. Jenny in 14 days from thence. The only articles worth republishing, follows:

HALIFAX, September 23. Yesterday morning sailed for England his Majesty's ship Asia, captain Murray, having under convoy the transports with the 24th and 26th regiments. Sunday evening arrived the ship Howard, capt. Frame from Amsterdam bound to N. York, cargo, gun, dry goods, &c. sent in by the Earl of Dublin. The ship parted with the Earl of Dublin in a gale on Wednesday last. Last Friday arrived here John Wentworth Esq. Attorney-General at Prince Edward-Island; and N. G. Crooke, Esq. Nephew to Lord Rollmore of Ireland. The Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island has resigned in favour of the Nephew of Sir John Wentworth and retires on a pension. September 24. Wednesday, the wind blowing hard, directly from the land, a ship was discovered in the offing, apparently in distress, having lost her main-mast by the board. As night began to approach she anchored in the Bay, and the following morning she was reported to be a ship from Norfolk in Virginia, belonging to Guernsey, out 26 days, having lost most of her crew since her departure, supposed by the Yellow Fever or some other malignant disorder. The wind coming fair, she came up the harbour and anchored within pistol shot of the town, with a yellow rag at her mizen-top mast, indicative of a diseased ship; and yesterday morning, some boats were sent from His Majesty's ships, which towed her into the middle of the harbour, where she now lies.

October 2. Friday last his Excellency Sir John Wentworth, failed for Sydney, in his Majesty's armed brig Earl of Moira, accompanied by Michael Wallace, and Lawrence Hartborne, Esquires.

Sunday arrived the ship Matilda, capt. Ellis, in 30 days from Liverpool. Her London date are only to August 23.
