LONDON, 23d March, 1771.

DEAR SIR, "We are likely to have some serious matters, of the political kind, ere long. Wilkes has brought the Commons into a damnable dilemma, by attacking his two old friends, the King, and Lord Halifax. I hope there remains some spirit of Englishmen among us, which will soon blast the men who are striving to ruin this great kingdom. A STRIKING LIKENESS.

Extract of a letter from a political character resident abroad, to his friend at Philadelphia. "The French proverb says that there are honest men, even in hell; where I should indeed as soon think of looking for them, as among that class of mortals called Jacobins. I will not say there is no such thing as an honest Jacobin, but I must own it has never been my lot to meet with one, and have instances of the contrary multiplying upon me every day. Christian charity bids us hope all things, but not to believe all things, and I should think my property just as safe in the hands of a Jacobin, as in those of a convicted thief. I know not whether you will think these sentiments illiberal, but these are times, and this is a subject that admit not of liberality. The utmost candor I can shew to a Jacobin is not to trust him; for then I believe of him that he will not betray my trust."

Extract from Essays on Political Society - now printing by Mr. William Young. "The American Congress, under their existing constitution, affords a conspicuous illustration of general principles of moral policy.

None of the ancient or modern leagues, none of the ancient or modern governments, in the Old World, exhibits so perfect a national model for municipal legislation upon the elective system. French vanity, indeed, has eulogized their policy as the sublimest monument of human reason. But the defects of the first edition of government which they call a constitution, were proved by its being overthrown almost as soon as it commenced operations: It became obsolete in its infancy. The next project, to which was given the name of constitution, was conceived under the ascendancy of Robespierre. This thing, even its parents, had not the confidence to exhibit to the French, for their opinion. The third French edition of government, called the constitution of year three, appeared to have more firmness of texture, and to be more capable of duration. Its exterior form, indeed, has been continued, while the brain and the heart, as far as it had any, were anatomized by order of such as directed the armed force.

Can the French Council of Ancients claim the honor of competing with the American Senate? Is it equally formed for dignity, for wisdom and stability?

Shall the French Council of Five Hundred pretend to rival the American House of Representatives as a popular chamber of legislation? The triennial election of the members of that Council, the interposal of an electoral assembly between them and the people, the annual rotation of one third of the members, the forced election of two thirds, were these the best expedients which the boasted French skill could devise for securing popular liberty?

The French legislature, if their two Council merit the name since the Fructidorian subjugation, is a duplicated revolutionary aristocracy; mutilated by pentarchical usurpation; nominally regulated by forms, which, at the bidding of the pentarchs, vanish before a decree of urgency.

Whether the framers of the American constitution were controlled by a happy necessity of political situation; whether their profound acquaintance with the most correct theories of government determined the frame of the system; or whether a manly force of mind, combined with scientific skill, aided by much personal experience, and influenced by a respectful attention to preconceived opinions, led to a system so original in its general structure, so interwoven in its parts, so compacted by the association of the whole; whether and how far any or all of these causes operated to produce the American constitution, one thing is certain. -The citizens of the New World have abundant cause to felicitate themselves on their political destiny. The American nation has now a municipal legislature constituted to "provide for the common defence and general welfare."
