BASSETTERRE, St. Kitts, Sept. 20.

The Brig Frankland, Mark Blunt, master, from Portsmouth, New Hampshire, for To-bago, was unfortunately upset by a gale of wind on the 4th inst. in lat. 22 20 long 57 50 by which accident the lost her masts and deck load of horses, she arrived at Nevis, yesterday.

The schr. John and Edward, of Bristol, Massachusetts, James Smithwick master, for Barbadoes, was also unfortunately upset on the same day, in lat 22 12 and long 56, whereby she lost her mast, and every thing on deck; the crew were two hours on the bottom, and without provisions for seven days; on the 11th, the schr. Hercules, Capt. Lovis, from Barbadoes, fell in with her and supplied her with every thing necessary: she also arrived at Nevis on the 17th.

On Tuesday last an American cartel, with French prisoners, failed hence for Guadalupe, and returned this day without any in exchange.

September 27.

His Majesty's ship Daphne, capt Matson, a few nights ago cut three American vessels out of Desada, which had been carried in there. She also cut the cable of a large ship at Balterre, Guadalupe, but it being calm; and a strong current in shore was obliged to abandon her.

We state from authority, that the Royal Assent has been given to "An act for indemnifying the Governor of Surinam, or the person acting as such, for having permitted the Importation and Exportation of Goods and Commodities in Foreign bottoms; and for making void all seizures of ships, vessels, or goods, for any thing done in pursuance of such permission," by which all seizures made subsequent to the 26th of Feb. 1800, are declared null and void, and the property to be restored to the Claimants, with costs.

On Monday last H. M. ship Surinam, Capt. Cole, brought in the schr. Eliza, capt. Eve, under Danish colours, from Guadalupe bound to St. Thomas, with a cargo of Sugar, Coffee and Cotton.

COMMUNICATION.

With pleasure we inform the public of the safe arrival in the ship Maryland, Capt. Webb, from London, the Floating Engines, so long expected; as also the gentleman who went from this place to superintend the manufacturing of the same; he has brought two engines on an entire new plan, on carriages with steel springs; the whole is arrived in good order.

Extract of a letter from captain Ladd, of the ship Charlotte, of Portsmouth (N. H.) dated Kingston. (Jam.) August 31, 1800, to his owners.

"We were boarded off the Caycos by his Britannic majesty's sloop of war the Tyfl-phon, commanded by captain Davies, who put on board us 12 French passengers, taken from the American brig Amazon, sent in here on suspicion. He likewise sent about 20lb. of beef and pork, and 50 weight of bread for their subsistence. When we arrived at Port Royal, the ship was stopped and detained 24 hours on account of said passengers; they not permitting us to go to town, although we had captain Davies' protection for the passengers.

The officer of police then gave us permission in writing, mentioning the Frenchmen as prisoners of war, with direction to deliver them over to the commissary of prisoners; who, when we had got to town, would not receive them, but told us not to land them on our peril; and would allow us nothing for their subsistence. We then applied to the governor, and every other officer who had any thing to do with prisoners or French passengers, but none of them would take cognizance of the matter, or allow us any satisfaction for their maintenance or the detention of the ship. At length the governor wrote us a billet, allowing us a half permission to land them on condition of their immediately taking passages to America, which we could not guarantee; we of course landed them, but are not without some fear of incurring the penalty, which is 200l. for each passenger, and six months imprisonment for myself.
