Washington September 1st, 1800.
Public Notice is hereby Given,
In pursuance of an act of Congress, passed on
the 23d day of April, one thousand eight
hundred, entitled "An act to establish a
General Stamp Office,"

I.
THAT a General Stamp-Office is now
established at the seat of government, in the
city of Washington, from whence there will
issue, from and after the date hereof, (upon
the application of the Supervisors of the
Revenue, under whose management the
collection of the stamp duties is placed) any
quantities of paper, parchment and vellum,
marked or stamped, and duly counter-stamp-
ed, with the following rates of duty which
are demandable by law:

For every skin or piece of vellum or parchment, or
sheet or piece of paper, upon which shall be
written or printed any or either of the instru-
ments or writings following, to wit,
Doll. C. M.
ANY certificate of naturalization 5
Any licence to practice, or certificate
of the admission, enrolment or reg-
istry of any counsellor, Solicitor
Advocate attorney, or professor, in
any court of the United States 10
Provided, that a certificate in any
one of the courts of the United States,
for any one of the said offices, shall
so far as relates to the payment of the
duty aforesaid, be a sufficient admis-
sion in all the courts of the United
States, for each and every of the said
offices.

Any grant or letters patent, under the
seal or authority of the United
States (except for lands granted
for military services) 4
Any exemption or certified copy
of any such grant or letters patent
(except for lands granted for mili-
tary services) 2
Any charter party, bottomry or re-
spondentia bond 1
Any receipt or discharge for or on ac-
count of any legacy left by any
will or other testamentary instru-
ment, or for any share or part of
a personal estate, divided by force
of any statute of distributions other
than to the wife, children or grand
children of the person deceased, the
amount whereof shall be above the
value of fifty dollars, and shall not
exceed the value of one hundred
dollars 25
When the amount thereof shall ex-
ceed the value of one hundred dol-
lars, and shall not exceed five hun-
dred dollars 50
And for every further sum of five
hundred dollars, the additional

Any policy of insurance or instru-
ment in nature thereof, when the
sum for which insurance is made
shall not exceed five hundred dol-
lars 25
When the sum insured shall exceed
five hundred dollars 1
Any exemption of what nature
soever, that shall pass the seal of
any court, other than such as it
may be the duty of the clerk of
such court to furnish for the use
of the United States, or some partic-
ular state 50

Any bond, bill single or penal, inland
bill of exchange, promissory
note or other note (other than any
recognizance, bill, bond or other
obligation or contract, made to or
with the United States, or any
state, or for their use respectively;
and any bonds required in any case
by the laws of the United States,
or of any state, upon legal process,
or in any judicial proceeding, or
for the faithful performance of any
trust or duty) 50
If above twenty dollars and not
exceeding one hundred dollars 10
If above one hundred and not ex-
ceeding five hundred dollars 25
If above five hundred and not ex-
ceeding one thousand dollars 50

Provided, that if any bonds or

reign port or place 10

The said duty being chargeable
upon each and every bill of lading
without respect to the number con-
tained in each set.
Any notes issued by the banks now
established or that may be hereafter
established within the United
States, other than the notes of
such of the said banks as shall agree
to an annual composition of one
per centum on the annual divi-
dends made by such banks, to their
stockholders respectively, accord-
ing to the following scale:
On all notes not exceeding fifty dol-
lars, for each dollar 6
On all notes above fifty dollars and
not exceeding one hundred dollars 50
On all notes above one hundred dol-
lars and not exceeding five hundred
dollars 1
On all notes above five hundred dol-
lars 2

Any protest or other notarial act
Any letter of attorney, except for
an invalid pension, or to obtain or
sell warrants for land granted by
the United States as bounty for
military services performed in the

Any inventory or catalogue of any fur-
niture, goods or effects, made in any
case required by law (except in cases
of goods and chattels distrained for
rent or taxes, and goods taken in vir-
tue of any legal process, by any officer
Any certificates of a share in any insur-
ance company, of a share in the bank
of the United States, or of any state
or other bank; 30
If above twenty dollars and not exceed-
ing one hundred dollars 10
If above one hundred dollars 25
If under twenty dollars, at the rate of
ten cents for one hundred dollars.

II.
That the power of the supervisors of the
Revenue to mark or stamp any vellum,
parchment or paper chargeable with duty;
will cease and determine from and after six
months from the date hereof, to wit, on the
last day of February 1801.

III.
That, if any persons shall, after the last
day of February 1801, have in their custody
or possession, any vellum, parchment or pa-
per, marked or stamped by the supervisors of
the Revenue, upon which any matter or
thing, charged with duty, shall not have
been written or printed, they may at any
time within the space of sixty days after
the said last day of February 1801, bring
or send such vellum, parchment and paper,
unto some office of inspection, and in lieu
thereof, receive a like quantity or value of
vellum, parchment and paper, duly stamped
in pursuance of the act herein before recited.
And in case any person shall neglect or re-
fuse, within the time aforesaid, to bring or
cause to be brought unto some officer of in-
spection, any such vellum, parchment or pa-
per, it is hereby declared, that the same will
hereafter be of no other effect or use, than
if it had never been marked or stamped, and
that all matters and things, which may af-
ter that time be written or printed upon any
vellum, parchment or paper, authorized to be
exchanged in manner aforesaid, will be of no
other effect, than if they had been written
or printed on paper, parchment or vellum,
not marked or stamped.

IV.
And for the convenience of those persons
who may be inclined to have their own vel-
lum, parchment and paper stamped or mark-
ed, it is hereby declared, that when any per-
son shall deposit any vellum, parchment or
paper at the office of a supervisor, accompa-
nied with a list, specifying the number and
denomination of the stamps or marks, which
are desired to be thereto affixed, the same
will be transmitted to the General Stamp-
Office, and there properly marked or stamped,
and forthwith sent back to the same super-
visor, who will thereupon collect the duties
and deliver the paper, parchment or vellum,
to the order of the person from whom the
same was received.
