NEW-YORK, November 13.

A CARD.

A gentleman last evening walking from the lower end of Liberty-street towards Greenwich street, fell in a trench that had been dug to convey the Manhattan water to a cellar, and shamefully left open, (which too often is done, and is of dark evenings highly dangerous) in his fall his head first struck, which is laid open just above one of his eyes in a shocking manner; had the blow been received half an inch lower, one of his eyes must have been lost.—How shamefully are the lives of the citizens put in jeopardy in this way. If there is a remedy for such evils, it is to be hoped those with whom it rests will prevent the like accident in future.

November 14.

Yesterday a fire broke out in Read-street—it originated in a soap-boiler's house, from a crack in the chimney. Three frame buildings fell a sacrifice—if it had happened in the night, the fire must have had a wide and more destructive range.

FIRE!—The fire which consumed the wooden building, yesterday, belonging to David Ackerman, the lower end of Read-street, originated from a stove pipe-hole in one of the Chimneys close under the rafter, which was stuffed with rags. The building was occupied by Mr. John Hull, tallow chandler, Mr. John Wingfield, sail maker and four other small families, who have all suffered considerably. A new stable belonging to Mr. Abraham King was pulled down to prevent the flames from reaching his house, the corner of Greenwich and Read-streets, and other adjacent buildings.—This, together with the usual alacrity of our firemen prevented the farther progress of the fire.

A few days since we published, on the authority of the Poughkeepsie Journal, an account of a duel, stated to have taken place between Lieut. J. C. Cooper, and a Mr. Perkins. In contradiction, the paper received last evening from thence says:—“We are requested by Lieut. J. C. Cooper, to say, that the account of the Duel published in our last, is totally false. It was handed to the printers by two persons of Rhinebeck, who positively asserted it to be a matter of fact, and as such it was inserted in our paper. Their names are left at this office, with permissions to give them up to any person who may wish to know them.”

NEW-LONDON, Nov. 12.

A ship of 400 tons burthen, built of the best materials, and handsomely constructed by Mr. Sheffield, was yesterday launched from the ship yard at Groton opposite this city. She is owned by Mr. B. Butler, and Messrs. J. and A. Woodward.

CHARLESTON, October 30.

General PINEKEY yesterday arrived in this city, from Virginia. He was met without the city by a party of light-horse, who escorted him to the house of his Sister, Mrs. Morry, in Tradd-street, where he alighted.

WASHINGTON, November 12.

On Monday the Electors of President and Vice President were chosen in Maryland.

It is said though not from authority, that the Federal Candidate has succeeded in the district composed of Frederick Town and Frederick County.

In George Town district T. Duckett, the republican candidate had 152 votes, and J. F. Deakins, the Federal Candidate, had 138 votes.

At Montgomery Court house Mr. Deakins had three fourths of the votes given.

At Marlborough the votes were nearly equal.

At Bladenburgh, including Washington City, Mr. Deakins had 201 votes, and Mr. Duckett, 91 votes.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 13.

Yesterday the several judges of the election districts of Baltimore county, for an elector of president and vice-president of the United States, met at the court-house in this city, when it appeared that the whole number of votes stood as follow:
