If in the political line any two men rendered to America, struggling for liberty, more distinguished service than others, those two men are JOHN ADAMS and JOHN JAY. In addition to their brilliant services in Congress they negotiated that treaty which severed us forever from Great-Britain; and, in spite of the influence of a Gallic party, obtained for us those boundaries, and those advantages which make us truly INDEPENDANT.

These are the men on whom those who during our contest for liberty were engaged against us, labor to heap up obloquy. With too much truth, therefore, does the Aurora say, that a spirit has been manifested for some years back, even in America, to cover the authors of our independence with odium."

PORT OF PHILADELPHIA. List of American vessels in the port of Cape Francois, taken from Busby's Coffee House Books, or Marine Register, [formerly Hancock & Co's.] November 3, 1800. Includes ship names like Venus, Reynold, Polly, Guill, Aurora, Howe, Ship Defiance, Smith, Schr. Elizabeth, Swafey, Scorpion, Sampson, Evelinn, Holmes, Zephira, Frazer, Phoebe, Windloy, Good Intent, Rowland, Paragon, Clark.

The Merrimack has taken a French brig of fourteen guns, returning from Currao to Guadalupe with troops. Schooner Sincerity, of and for this port, from Port Republick, has arrived at Norfolk in distress. Brig Sally, Hampton, of and for Philadelphia from Currao, was spoken December 4th, in latitude 33, 02, N. longitude 68, 00, W. all well.

Arrived, ship Ann, Lilly, Dominica, twenty-one days. Left there brig Enterprize, for Wilcaisset in a few days; Mary of Portland, recaptured; Cynthia, Salem, do Satisfactin, Wilcaisset, just arrived—November 16, latitude 21, 40, longitude 67, spoke brig Atlantic, fourteen days from Boston, for Jamaica.

ARRIVED, December 10. Ship Neptune, Lane, Newry 62 Schr. Louisa Bridger, Eve, Antigua— Determined Rover, Currao 32 Sloop Minerva, Bell, do 27

Two ships, two brigs and a schooner, arrived at Norfolk, December 4th, spoke the brig Captain Ruffell, from Antigua, thirty-six days out, bound to Philadelphia. December 2, Captain Bell in latitude 31, 40, longitude 79, 30, spoke schooner Lucy and ship Herbert, from Havana to N-York, out thirteen days—She intended to put into Charleston unless the wind proved more favorable. Same day the above schooner spoke the brig West Point, from St. Jago de Cuba for Philadelphia, spoke at 11—she also intended to put into Charleston for the same reason. December 4, in latitude 33, longitude 68, spoke the brig Sally, Hampton, from Currao to Philadelphia. Left the brig Nymph, Charles, of New York, in the Mona Passage.

Abergawony. The Maria was boarded by a Spanish felucca, and had sent Jones of the sloop John, taken off the east end a few days ago put on board.
