And in case any person shall neglect or re-fuse, within the time aforesaid, to bring or cause to be brought unto some officer of inspection, any such vellum, parchment or pa-per, it is hereby declared, that the same will thereafter be of no other effect or use, than fit had never been marked or stamped, and that all matters and things, which may after that time be written or printed upon any vellul, parchment or paper, authorized to be exchanged in manner aforefaid, will be of no other effect, than if they had been written or printed on paper, parchiment or vellum, not marked or stamped.
