The United States of America, represented by fifteen women, appear in the temple of Minerva, for the purpose of decorating with wreaths the Bust of President WASHINGTON, already crowned by immortality and Liberty; the Eagle supporting the Arms of America, holds forth the Legend thereof, expressive of the unanimity of sentiment which animates them. The Statue of Minerva is seen under a portico, decorated with military trophies, emblems of the Victories obtained against the enemies of Liberty; in the foreground appear History, who, attentive to this interesting scene, records it in her annals, in order to be transmitted to posterity.

The original picture was executed on a large scale, by JOHN TROWBRIDGE, an Italian artist, on occasion of the entertainment given at Ricketts's Amphitheatre in Philadelphia, on February 23, 1796, for the celebration of the birth-day of the President.

The Copperplate (24 inches by 18) will be engraved, with the greatest care by a Parisian artist, lately arrived in this city, and will be ornamented in the border, with the arms of the United States of America, and of each particular State.
