WHEREAS the General Affembly did, on the fourth day of April last, refove, "That the Governor be requested to life a poclamation, reciting the ask entitled" an act to prevent intrusions on lands, within the counties of Northampton, Northumber, and and Luzerne," and enjoining obedience to the fame; and that he be forthwish requested to easife the same to be published in the newspapers of the stace of New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Rhode Illand and Massichulstis: and whereas, the act, in the fuid resolution referred to is experised in the following words:

"Section 1. Be is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly net, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the fame, That if any person shall, after the passing of the act, take possification of, enter, intrude or fettle on any lands within the limits of the counties of Northampton, Northumberland, or Luzerne, by virtue or under colour of any conveyance of half share right, or any other pretended title not derived from the authority of this commonwealth, or of the late proprietaries of Pennsylvania before the Revolution, fusch person, upon Poleng duly convicted thereof, upon indictment in any court of over and terminer, or court of general quarter (estions, to be beld in the proper country, shall forfeit and pay the sum of two hundred dellars, one half to the use of the informer, and shall also be tubject to such imprisonment, not exceeding twelve months, as the court before whom such conviction is had may in their discretion direct.
