If, for instance, we should say to any one, that the active and useful power of steam was known to the ancients, he would doubtless shrug his shoulders and cry, Bah! This is an invention of the moderns. The This is an invention of the moderns. The ancients knew nothing of this great inoving force which has shortened space, brought distant countries comparatively within each other's embrace, supplanted manual labor, and given such a mighty impulse to the productive energies of the human race. Yet, let us halt awhile amid our self-adulation. Let us take a turn among the ancient remains of Palestine, of Greece, of Babylon, and Egypt, and while gazing on the ruins of those mighty and stupendous structures which remain as evithe pertinent question, "By what motive power were these immense blocks of granite raised to their position? How were they cut? How moved?" That the ancients did employ other than more hand force, or simple mechanical contrivances for this purpose, will appear evident from the following allegory, to be found in the Rabbinical writings of the Jews. When King Solomon was about to build the temple, he was anxious to procure a certain worm which possesses the extraordinary power of dividing the largest and heaviest stones. But no one knew where he could obtain this precious insect. Finally, King Solomon discovered that Asmodeus, the demon, or as he is termed in Hobrew, Estmodul, was in pos-session of the secret. But how was he to exsession of the secret. Dut now was a puz-tort it from such a source? Here was a puz-la. However. Solomon soon resolved upon the However, Solomon soon resolved upon a stratagem. It was this: Eshmodai was in the habit of repairing every day to a certain well in the desert, where he used to allay his thirst, which was indeed excessive. Now, the wise king had a large pit dug close by the well of water, which resembled the latter so much that no one could tell the difference. This he filled with spirits, and sealed up the other. When Asmodeus came as usual to allay his thirst, he drunk the spirits instead of the water, which so intoxicated him, that Solomon at once bound him in iron chains, and thereby got the secret of the worm with which he cut the blocks used for the Temple. Now, if this allegory be rightly interpreted, it will prove to a demonstration that King Solomon resorted to the power of steam as a direct agent in directing the uniting and maying of the imin effecting the cutling and moving of the immense granito piles which formed both the groundwork and the superstructure of the Temple. The word "Esh modai" is a Hebrew composed of three distinct words, viz. Esh, Mo, dai—fire, water, sufficient,—and in their connected form, therefore, signify a sufficiency of fire and water, which are precisely the elements necessary to produce steam-or the worm which insinuates itself with ful rapidity into the machinery used by man for various purposes.
But, besides this definition of the name, let us look to the whole description given of the manner in which the secret for cutting the stones was obtained, and we shall have the whole "modus operandi" for generating steam illustrated. There was a well, says the fable, in the desert, which Solomon sealed up, but he had a larger pit dug close by, which he filled with spirits.
