The Water Department—Important Move—For a long time there has been considerable confusion in some of the details of the but-iness of the Water Department, and a reform to better enable the efficers of the department to perform their duties has been demanded by the public interests. An ordinañe to accomplish this object passed Solect Genecil, on Thursday, by a very decided vote. The ordinance provides for a re-assessment of water rents in all parts of the city; but perhaps the most important feature of the bill is the imposition of a water tax upon every house in every street, isne or alley through which water pipes run. There are very many houseain the city which have not the water introduced upon their premises, and the occupants of them are compelled to obtain the needful element in an ind-rect way, while the owners of the property, escape the payment of water rents. In other instances a single hydrant is reade to supply an entire row of honess belvinging to the sems owner, and the latter supplies, perhaps a dreen houses, with water, at five dollars a year. The new ordinance provides a remedy for this abuse by levying a water tax upon every house past which the pipes are run, and which has not the water introduced. This tax is to be equal to the amount of rant paid if the water was introduced, so that the owners of some houses, with one hydrant between them. introduced. This tax is to be equal to the amount of rant paid if the water was introduced, so that the owner of a fozen houses, with one hydrant between them, will be compelled to pay sixty dollars a year, instead of five dollars as under the present system. The effect of this law will be not only to prevent frauds upon the Water Department, but it will tend to prome te cleanliness, comfort and health, by encouraging the general introduction of water.
