Suicide of a Boy.

Intelligence was received in Ravenna, Ohio, on Thureday afternoon last, that Lyman Goodale, aged sixteen years, a son of George Goodale—a wealthy farmor, residing two miles north of Shalersville village—had that morning committed suicide by outting his throat.
