Wedave in our own country one of the most distinguished living laticographers, and one of the most faithful and conselentious workers in the unambitions bui useful departments of literary investigation, in the person of Dr. J. E. Wor-cester, a brief sketch of whose life and labors will sorve as a fitting introduction to what we propuse to say as to the great work he has in pre-paration, and has long been occupied upon. He was graduated at Vale College, in 1811, and from that time to the present momant he has been principally cooupled in the field of loxicography. He commenced his labors in this dopartment by editing "Jahnson's Eeglish Dictionary as in-proved by Todd, and abridged by Oholmers, with Walker's Proncoulog Dictionary Combined?" which was published in Boston in 'B27, and im-mediately took its place as the best English di-tionary extant for popular and practical use. He was next employed by Mr. Sherman Converse to prepare an abridgement of Dr. Webster's Ameri-can Dictionary. Into this work Dr. Worester in-troduced upwards of three thousand words which had escaped the research of Dr. Webster in the preparation of his larger work, but which have since been added to it by his successors. It contained, i various vocabularies, upwards, of one huu thousand words, and has received the warm incusang words, and has received the warm dem-mendations of scholars wherever the English lan-guage is used. Upon these several manuals of Dr. Worcester, the peculiar characteristics of his mind were dis-tinotity impressed. Conspicuous among these we should rank his sound good sense, and accurate judgment; especially displayed in a cautious dis-trust of innovation, a due respect for established forms, and a reluciance to push a pedantic system further than it can be legitimately carried. To this cardinal trait of mind should be added an in-vincible pationce of toil, the results of which are seen in a great amount of philological knowledge and a thorough acquasintance both with the labers of his predecessors and with the origin, structure, and growth of the English language. We may ilways rest assured that any conclusion to which Dr. Worcester may have come, has been reached after patient reflection and careful examination of the subject on all sides. It is hardly necessary to say that the interit of a lexicographer, and the value of his labors, depend in some measure upon the qualities he has not, as well as upon those heas.
