ENGINE HOUSE AND MACHINE SHOPS OF THE PHI-LADELPHIA, WILLINGTON, AND BALTINORE RAIL. ROAD DESTROYED. n the Baltimore Patriot of yesterday evening.l

This merning, we seen one and two o'clock, one of the most destructive fires that have taken place in our city for some time, occurred in the building used by the Philadelphia, Wilmington, and Bailfmore Railroad Company, located on Canton avenue, and occupied by them for the storage of their locomotives and the manufacturing of their machinery. From what we can learn in reference to this configgration, it appears that the locomotive "Magicilis," which had arrived between 12 and 1 o'clock, with a freight train, had drawn the same to the Prattistreet bridge, as is, the usual outtom every morning, and after having given the train in charge of one of the engineers of the Baltimore and Ohlo Railroad, returned to the building at a few miretes past one, o'clock, and the engineer having completed his work, left the place for his home, presuming that everything was perfectly safe. About twenty minutes to two o'clock Mr. Wm.
Doto, who is employed in this building in the capacity of a private watchman, was about to kindle his fire, in the stationary engine, whon he discovered that the building was filled with smoke, and fearing that all was not rafe, commenced searching the same, when he discovered fistness

The entire building, used as the engine house, proved a total loss, in which were isoluded five locomotives, viz; "Magnolla," "Cincinnati," "Battimore," "Maryland," and "Virginia," together with a quantity of materials deposited therein.
