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

Letter from Canada. Correspondence of The Press.]
MONTREAL, August 23, 1859. The religious houses here, or rather such of them as are open, are always visited by strangers. I be-lieve there are eight numeries in and around this city. I visited the Black Nunnery, and the Gray Nunnery. At the Black Nunnery (called such from the dress worn) I saw the nuns discharging the du-ties of their offices of love to the sick, to the infirm and to the aged. At twelve o'clock M., all the tourists in the city generally are to be found in the principal chapel attached to the Gray Nunnery. At that hour the nuns enter the chapel in procession. They kneel in the body of the church, reciting in concert the office appropriate to the hour.

After remaining some time in silent meditation, they arise and rotire. With strangers watching m they appeared to be entirely unconscious the fact, for not an eye, even for an instant, was turned on the spectators. After the nuns leave the chapel, the strangers generally pass through the establishment. We saw little girls sewing while engaged in childish prattle. We saw boys from two years up to twelve playing ball—some playing with kites—and all as happy as larks. In yet another room, old men engaged in suitable call entirely helpless, seated in movable chairs, which patient. During our visit we saw those in the last soling them in their afflictions, and cheering them on their journey to Heaven. The rooms for the aged and the bed-ridden are so constructed that by opening folding doors, the chapel is exposed to view, and they can thus hear Mass and Vespors every day of their lives; a consolation to them of the highest importance. When any one of the pa tients dies, the body is decently and honorably in-terred, and it is beyond the rick of surgical violence. The order, the cleanliness, the quietude, the pure atmosphere, the comfort of the patients the happy faces of the Sisters and the Nuns, all tend to make the member of the Catholic church feel justly proud of these institutions, and the Protestant gentleman willingly expresses his admiration. There are no alms houses in Canada. The care of-not as if they were a burden, but as if the were a blessing which Heaven had vouchsafed. Each religious denomination takes care of its own. The schools, seminaries, and colleges in Causdi rank very high. In institutions in this city, children receive a first-rate education without any charge whatever. If their parents can afford it they pay a dollar per month. An Irish conchman who drove me around Mount Royal, told me his daughter, seven years of age, can read and write both English and French.

I have visited Mothodist, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Unitarian and Catholic churches, and strang as it may appear, they are all superior to those at home in architectural beauty and interior arrangements. The pews are all large and commedies each having a ledge on which to lean while kneeling, hooks for hats, shelves for books, umbrellas, parasols, &c.
